You Know What's Overdue...? By Bob Conrad, Library Director

BATAVIA – When somebody learns what you do for a living, how do they react? If you work in a public library, you get used to some common reactions:

One is a look of guilt, or of actual fear – as if they think we're going to have them arrested! – that crosses their face as they confess that they owe us "like a million dollars" for material they never returned as a teen. Never mind that library fees typically max out around \$5 per item or the replacement cost of

materials: their point is that they haven't been to a library since they were a kid, and they feel kind of bad about that..

Better is when they react with delight, and begin talking about their favorite books, movies, music, and library services (...but mostly books). This usually leads to a lively conversation, so be sure to invite library workers to all of your dinner and cocktail parties!

Or, finally, they inform us – either woefully or gleefully – that soon we'll be out of our jobs. That everything is online now. That nobody reads any more. And that nobody uses libraries.

I have found this third type perplexing. It isn't that we're unaware of certain trends, particularly the decades-long decline among adults in reading for leisure. But the libraries I've worked at have been such busy places,, with people waiting to be let in at open, and people needing to be thrown out at close; with bookdrops demanding to be emptied, regularly, of actual books, which actual people have checked out and returned; with waiting lists for popular new materials, and waiting periods for interlibrary delivery of esoteric materials. "Have you been to my library?" I often asked the third kind of person! (continued on page 2)

From the Youngest...

In order to get their own library cards, kids at the Richmond Memorial Library need to be able to write their own first and last name. So here's a trick question: how old is the *youngest* child enrolled in a Richmond Library program?

If you said *one month*, you're right! With help from their caregivers, kids don't need library cards to visit the library or attend storytime, and they can enroll in *Imagination Library* on the day that they're born.

With *Imagination Library*, we will mail a new, age-appropriate book (to keep!) directly to the home of any child, birth to age five, who lives in the Batavia City School District. That's up to 60 books to help make "Every Child Ready to Read" before they even get to Kindergarten!

Part of Genesee County's privatelyfunded "Aging in Place" program, SAGE delivers library materials and services directly to the homes of people age 60 and up who, for whatever reasons, cannot always get to the library on their own. Services are built around the individual's needs. For example: book and movie delivery to VA residents without automobiles of their own; wintertime delivery to otherwise active seniors who prefer not to drive in ice and snow; library fine forgiveness for patrons and families struggling with memory loss: or home training on video chat and library apps like Skype and Overdrive.

And most of the time, they haven't. Like those in the first group, it has been years, if not decades, since they stepped through a library's doors. If they read, they buy their own books. If they don't read, they're streaming and downloading their movies and music. And since they don't use a library, they assume nobody else does, either. They're astonished to learn that our library, with a service population just over 19,000 people, has 22,000 active library cardholders (a third of them from outside of our service area). They would never guess that the busiest year in America's public libraries, as measured by material circulation and library visits, was not fifty or one hundred years ago, but in 2010, at the height of the economic crisis.

To all of you who haven't been here in a while: drop in again. If you do owe us money, it's probably not as much as you think. Whatever you owe, we'll give you free access to our digital materials, anyway. Our streaming and downloadable services are getting easier to use, with more popular content available every year. There is never an overdue, lost, or damaged fee for any of our streaming or downloadable content, and for some of the music and magazine downloads, there isn't even a due date – you can keep a copy for as long as you like.

Perhaps you will discover that the only thing overdue at the library.... is you!

Message from Library President Michael Rivers

The proposed 2017-18 library budget was written, in part, to accommodate two competing mandates from New York State. On one hand, we're faced with a mandatory increase to minimum hourly wages; on the other, we remain subject to New York State's property tax cap.

Thanks to an expected increase in PILOT revenues and the public's approval of the Batavia City School District's 2020 Vision plan (which addresses many of the library's capital needs), we were able to modestly increase the wages of most hourly employees and increase the allocation for library A/V materials, even while keeping the tax levy increase under 2%.
