PROPOSITION:

Shall the Board of Education of the City School District of Batavia be authorized to raise by tax \$24,878 to increase the annual appropriation from \$1,309,376 to \$1,334,254 for the benefit of the Richmond Memorial Library.

Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2018-2019 Bob Conrad, Library Director

The library has only two fiscal challenges to resolve in its next fiscal year. One is a modest increase to employee health insurance and workers' comp insurance costs, combined with upward pressure on library wages driven by New York's minimum wage increase. The other is a projected decrease in Economic Development Councilnegotiated PILOT revenues (Payments in Lieu of Taxes).

Fortunately, these changes were substantially offset by three employees accepting an early retirement incentive. Even though New York State would allow us to ask for a Tax Levy increase of more than 4% without breaking its Tax Cap, we are asking for an increase of only 1.9%.

Another development is the creation of a small Capital Improvement line in this year's budget. The Richmond Memorial Library is now, as always, included in the Batavia City School District's capital improvement plans, so we can look forward to four new bathrooms, improvements to lighting and landscaping, and care and maintenance to older parts of the building, all scheduled to take place over the next two years. But the school district operates on a 5-year capital improvement cycle, while the state has been awarding library construction funds annually, funding up to 75% of qualifying library projects in our part of the state. It is my hope that, by leveraging a modest Capital Improvement line this year, we can bring up to three times what we spend back in state funds, and make the kinds of improvements that will sustain our traditions of excellence and relevance further into the 21st century.
