

We will give away a copy of the Richmond Reads title, **Southernmost** by Silas House, at each Spring 2019 Books Sandwiched In session!




May 1: The Library Book by Susan Orlean

On the morning of April 28, 1986, a fire alarm sounded in the Los Angeles Public Library. As the moments passed, the patrons and staff who had been cleared out of the building realized this was not the usual fire alarm. As one fireman recounted, "Once that first stack got going, it was 'Goodbye, Charlie." The fire was disastrous: it reached 2000 degrees and burned for more than seven hours. By the time it was extinguished, it had consumed four hundred thousand books and damaged seven hundred thousand more. Investigators descended on the scene, but more than thirty years later, the mystery remains: Did someone purposefully set fire to the library—and if so, who? (from publisher summary)



Reviewer Bob Conrad was born in the Rochester suburb of Irondequoit, NY, and raised by parents who read to him. Bob moved to Chicago for college and stayed there for 22 years. He worked in retail and in academic libraries before completing his Masters in Library and Information Science at Dominican University, then started working for Chicago Public Library in 2004. He was a branch manager for seven years before accepting the appointment to Library Director of the Richmond Memorial Library in Batavia, where he keeps a beautiful home with many books and only one cat.

May 8: Educated by Tara Westover




Tara Westover was seventeen the first time she set foot in a classroom. Born to survivalists in the mountains of Idaho, she prepared for the end of the world by stockpiling home-canned peaches and sleeping with her "head-for-the-hills bag." The family was so isolated from mainstream society that there was no one to ensure the children received an education, and no one to intervene when one of Tara's older brothers became violent. As a way out, Tara began to educate herself, learning enough mathematics and grammar to be admitted to Brigham Young University. Her quest for knowledge would transform her, taking her over oceans and across continents, to Harvard and to Cambridge. (from publisher summary)

May 15: The Good Neighbor: The Life and Work of Fred Rogers by Maxwell King

Drawing on original interviews, oral histories, and archival documents, Maxwell King traces Rogers' personal, professional, and artistic life through decades of work, including a surprising decision to walk away from the show to make television for adults, only to return to the neighborhood with increasingly sophisticated episodes, written in collaboration with experts on childhood development. 
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
